# HISTORY WITH JOSH QUACKENBUSH

By the end of March 1943, shortly after Eisenhower appointed Patton the command of II Corps in North Africa, Soviet soldiers had been locked in a life and death struggle against German forces for over 20 months. During this time 3,984,930 Soviet

soldiers had been killed or captured. By the war's end approximately 27 million Soviet civilians and military personnel would lose their lives. The land seized from Germany during its assault on the Soviet Union can compare to an occupation of the United States from the East Coast to the Mississippi River and into the eastern Great Plains. Letters between Franklin Roosevelt and Joseph Stalin reveal that survival of the Soviet Union was absolutely essential for defeating Nazi Germany. Understanding this important fact, Roosevelt arranged to have military equipment and vital supplies sent to the ravaged country.

To divert German forces away from the Soviet Union, Stalin pleaded with Churchill and Roosevelt to launch a cross channel invasion into France. Winston Churchill knew the Allies might face defeat if they invaded France in 1943, so he chose Italy, believing it to be the "soft underbelly" of the enemy. General Mark Clark would later call it, "one tough gut."

80 years ago in the early morning hours on September 9, 1943 General Mark Clark's Fifth Army composed of American and British soldiers stormed the beaches around Salerno, Italy. Even though Italy had officially surrendered the day before, the Germans had taken up defensive positions of the mainland. The men serving in the U.S. 36<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division were ordered to invade the beaches south of Salerno, at Paestum. As the men were coming ashore in LST's, heavy enemy gunfire from the shore erupted and the German Luftwaffe appeared in the skies overhead to bomb the approaching vessels.

"A lot of those LST's, they took direct hits," remembers Herman Zerger, a rifleman with the 141st Infantry Regiment. "There were bodies floating all around." After landing on shore, we had to "get off the beach fast. You don't want to stay there because they were zeroing in on you." As the men began running toward the hills, they "were taking heavy casualties" from enemy fire coming at them "from all angles" along the way. "When you see your buddies right alongside dropping, you just wonder. . . . It was very frightening for me," says Zerger, "and I had to get my bearings . . . so I could be a good soldier and fight hard."

British and American warships near Salerno provided supporting fire for the troops as they made their way inland. One such ship participating in the early morning hours of the invasion was the USS Savannah, a Brooklyn-class light cruiser. Warrant officer Patrick O'Neill on board the Savannah explains:

were landing salvos, those We projectiles over there knocking out tanks and protecting the advance of our troops. In fact, they could hardly get off their boats because the Germans were waiting for them. I don't know how they found out they were going to be there, but it is a good thing we were there to knock out their tanks, mortars, and guns so our troops could debark towards shore. officer Our main gunnery received information from the army where to direct fire. We did have spotter planes that flew up until we lost them all eventually. They got shot down or whatever, because the Germans could see that those spotter planes were directing where our ammunition would land, even though we couldn't see, because it was over the mountain [several miles] away.

As the battle unfolded near Salerno the Italian naval ships were on route toward Malta to unite with the British. The German Luftwaffe responded with planes carrying Hitler's new wonder weapon, the Fritz-X remote controlled bomb. This bomb operated by joystick made two direct hits on the flagship of the Italian fleet. The battleship Roma sank taking an admiral and over 1.200 other sailors with it. counteract the Allied invasion and the threat of naval gun fire, German planes began to bomb the Allied ships, landing crafts, and other vessels near Salerno. On September 11<sup>th</sup>, the Fritz-X precision guided bomb hit gun turret number 3 of the USS Savannah, smashing through her decks and detonating 36 feet below. This would be the largest bomb to strike any U.S. naval ship during World War II. O'Neill describes the event:

I was in the electric shop, which was on third deck a little bit forward to mid-ship, not far from one of our watertight bulkheads that actually saved our lives. It was a tremendous blast that nobody can imagine, and fire spewed back up and out of the number 3 turret. Our ship shook violently and just seconds after that another terrible explosion and that's when part of our magazine blew. It was really a state of catastrophe because the interior communication department was located in the area that was completely demolished. So we had no communication whatsoever. It

was just absolutely dead silent and all the lights went out. We were sitting there and I could hear water splashing on the outer bulkhead and it was not a very good feeling because you didn't know how the ship was going down and we didn't dare open up those watertight compartments for fear of flooding.

The water quickly flooded the ammunition storage area of the ship. This prevented the whole magazine from igniting—saving the Savannah from the fate that had befallen the Battleship Roma. "After they discovered that the water was contained in the forward area," says O'Neill, "they then began to open up the hatches so we could move about. With the concussion and fire we lost [206] members of our crew (including) 14 electricians who were personal friends of mine. I was called to see if I could identify one of them and that was tough to do." Surprisingly, O'Neill had been previously assigned to turret number 3, until being moved to the electric shop by his commanding officer. "I certainly wouldn't have been here today," O'Neil says. "I must have a guardian angel somewhere."
