HISTORY WITH JOSH QUACKENBUSH

Happy New Years everyone! The following is from interviews I conducted many years ago. Someday I may clean it up and write a book but here it is rough for you to read now. If I get enough of you liking it, I'll keep going.

80 years ago the U.S. Women's Army Corps (WAC) sent their new recruits to Italy to serve in noncombat support roles. Harriet Daniel from Missouri remembers her overseas training before being shipped out to Caserta, Italy:

I had orders and they sent me to Daytona Beach, Florida and that's where I took my overseas training. That's where we did pushups and we had to do karate and we did all the drilling, going through the gas chamber. We would go in after putting on our gas masks and then they make you take it off to come out; of course it was tear gas. It was pretty rough. We did long marches and we had to carry our packs and then all of a sudden they'd whistle and that was an air raid and you'd have to crawl. It was pretty rough training. We learned how to come down the side of the ship on ropes. We couldn't write home and tell our parents, nobody knew that we were going overseas. Our parents did not know, all they knew was that we were in training, but they didn't know what for. . . . We went to Newport News, Virginia and that's where we sailed out of. As we were marching along there were GI's alongside of the road. They were whistling and carrying on you know and one of them said, "They look like soldiers, they march like soldiers, they don't smell like soldiers."

There were rumors that the women were being sent overseas just to service the guys. The reason we went over there, we released the men to go into combat. We replaced the men that were in the rear echelon. Caserta was Mediterranean Allied Air Force Headquarters. That's where all the Generals and the Fifth Army girls, WACs were still there. We were going to work in the Palace of Caserta which was never finished. It still was an impressive place, but it was cold. They wanted to billet us in the palace and our company commander said no way, the fifth army girls were living in tents and she said "My girls aren't living in tents and they aren't living in that cold old palace." So she got the chamber of commerce building which was named Villa Rosa and that's where we were billeted. It was a two story building with a large skylight. So we got together and picked who we wanted to room with. We had a choice of going around to the rooms and we went to this one room, it was a good size room and one of the girls walked in and she said, 'Oh my gosh, looks like Sherman's been through here.' So we became Sherman's platoon. There were 10 of us who lived in this one room and we had five bunks that were made out of two by fours. We had mattress covers, a quilt, and an army blanket—no sheets, no pillows, ha, ha, no, no, no.

Although Harriett Reed was far from the front lines of the battlefield she found out soon it could be dangerous serving in the so called rear echelon:

When we first arrived in Italy, you see the Germans were only but 15 miles from us. There was only one battalion between us and the Germans. You could hear the artillery and see the flashes. . . . We also of course, had air raids, because you see the German air force was still bombing Naples and we were a secondary target. . . . In fact one night, I was working at the palace and the air-raid sirens went off. Of course all the windows were blacked, no light. No

lights, everything's blacked out, I mean on the outside. When you went out through the little town of Caserta, it was as dark as pitch. The air raid sirens went off and of course, we were all curious and went running to the shutters and pull them open to the palace to look out. We were up on the fifth floor. All of a sudden it was just like daylight, just like the sun came up! Of course the Germans dropped those flares. It's amazing! It just goes from dark to just like it is right now! So then the antiaircraft batteries they had around started going off and this captain came and grabbed us and made us go down to the bottom floor. We used to sit up on top of the hill and watch them bomb Naples and you could see, every fifth bullet was a tracer and it's just like fireworks.

The rocky hilltop of Monte Cassino is home to a historic monastery dating back to the 6th century. Being built and rebuilt, the abbey overlooking the town of Cassino had already seen its share of conflict and natural disaster. The Germans at Monte Cassino faced divisions from France, Britain, America, India, New Zealand, and Poland in some of the most intense series of battles fought during World War II. The beginning phases of the operation were led by the French Expeditionary Corp, British X Corp, and the U.S. II Corp. On 20 January 1944, the U.S. 36th Infantry Division was ordered to attack the Germans across the Rapido River. Private Robert Doby from North Carolina recalls his experience as a new replacement when being assigned to the Rapido River near Monte Cassino:

These guys were seasoned veterans by then. They had come all the way up from Salerno up to Rapido and had seen a lot of action between there. Most of them at that point were Texans. The Texas National Guard had been mobilized and federalized into an army division. This was reality, I'd been playing war during maneuvers and basic training and all this, but when I reached the staging area where my division was it became reality. They had all my tools laid out in a neat little pile, my weapons and everything, the playing war was over with, this was reality. It was really the biggest display of firepower that I saw really during the whole war. A lot of it was at night time when they tried to cross the river. Our intelligence had told us that the Germans didn't have any armor, no big guns, and they weren't very well prepared to meet us at the river. That's what our intelligence said, but they were dead wrong. That's right where the Gustav line came through right before Cassino there and they were well prepared and ready for us. Well the first two regiments, the 141st and the 143rd had tried to make night crossings. I was in the 142nd of course and when we entered that area we went in at night and all this was going on. You could see the machine gun tracers and hear the Screaming Meemies. Oh, it was the most demoralizing sound you'll ever hear! And they had them in force at the Rapido; all night long they went on. Of course, they had the artillery and the tanks. Everything was zeroed in on the river. The Rapido River at that time was swollen by the winter rains. . . . The water was swift and it was up to about 12 feet deep. The Germans had removed all the trees, the bushes, anything that would give you cover or concealment. They had an open field of fire and they had stopped up the river and flooded the whole area. It just became a quagmire and then they mined it. So, you know, we didn't really have a chance. It was not militarily feasible to cross that river. . . . All in all we lost about [2,100] men, either killed, wounded, or captured. [Exact numbers were-2,019 with 934 wounded, 770 prisoners with only 64 Germans killed and 179 wounded]. We were in reserve at the river and the time came for us to make our crossing. It was sometime in the early morning hours. Listening to the display of firepower that was going on, we knew it was bad. We knew that we had lost a lot of men. And we were on our way down to the river to make the next crossing when they called it off. They finally woke up and realized what the situation was.

The British faced less hardship to the south by crossing the shallower waters of the Garigliano River. "We saw a lot of British troops," says Doby. "They were trained in a different way than we were. They would build fires at night; we weren't allowed to even strike a match. The British would say, 'The Jerries know where we are anyway.' They would stop a convoy and make their tea. They really did that. 'Stop the war; I've got to have my tea.' They were a good bunch of guys, but you know, they did things a little differently than we did."

The successful British river crossing forced the Germans to send in reinforcements who were in reserve near Rome. This diverted the enemy and helped contribute to the success of an Allied coastal invasion at a place called Anzio. The objective is to draw the Germans away from Casino and make it possible for the Allies to breakthrough to Rome. The coastal town of Anzio, south of Rome, was a hotspot for affluent Italians dating back to the time of the Great Roman Empire. Called Antium in ancient times; Anzio was the birthplace of Nero, the Roman emperor accused of playing his fiddle while Rome burned. The towns of Nettuno and Anzio lying along the seacoast were in close proximity to each other. In the early morning hours of January 22nd American and British forces invaded Anzio and Nettuno. With the enemy being taken completely by surprise, the Allies faced little resistance in securing the beachhead. The days and months that would follow would prove otherwise.
